Some hints:

RealPlayer 10 comes in a disk image. This normally makes it necessary to drag and drop the application to where you want it, most likely the Applications folder. You have two choices. You can delete the older version before dragging in the new version, or you can drop the new application into the folder containing old and click on the "Replace" button in the resulting Copy window. This is possible because most of the time the names of the old and new applications are the same.

In the case of the latest version, the name has been changed from RealOne to RealPlayer. If you drag and drop this application into the Applications folder, the old one will not be overwritten. If you have the RealOne icon in your Doc, double-clicking this alias will open the Old player, not RealPlayer. If it is your intention to have both versions available, at least 'til you get a comfortable with RealPlayer 10, you will need to drag RealPlayer 10 to the Doc to create an alias, as the old alias will not launch RealPlayer 10 due to the change in name.

I absolutely insist on gambling. Actually, if you have the old and new versions, you're not likely to test the new version.

The security hole was fixed in the final version.

AVI and some mpeg files are a multimedia format more popular with the darkside. You may have received such a files from well meaning friends (does this sound familiar?) (it is) only to find out, that though they have a QuickTime icon, QuickTime will complain that it does not have the proper tools to open the file. Have no fear. The previously mentioned VLC can easily handle that AVI file. I trust you installed it from one of the previous DOM's. Otherwise, go to VersionTracker.com and look up VLC. The current version is 0.7.2.

As noted with the latest non-beta version Firefox (0.10.1), a zero in front means it is not a final 1.0 version. It does not seem to matter with either Firefox or VLC. Either will perform and function as a final version. I have been using VLC since the 0.42 version with much enjoyment.

As noted, Mozilla.org has released Firefox 0.10.1, a security update to the open-source browser that could allow a malicious hacker to trick a user into saving a file that could delete files from a user's download directory.

If the gods allow, I will gladly to show VLC in action. I think I offered this the last time.

Use these shortcuts to temporarily turn on Full Keyboard Access or access the menu bar, Dock, and other areas on the screen. This is not a full security system, as re-booting the Mac returns everything to default.

Action	Shortcut
Turn Full Keyboard Access on or off	Control + F1
Highlight the menu bar	Control + F2
Highlight the Dock	Control + F3
Highlight the toolbar	Control + F5
Highlight a tool palette then each palette in order	Control + F6
Access all controls in the current dialog if you select the option to highlight only text boxes and lists	Control + F7

Of course, one could always use these shortcuts for mischief.

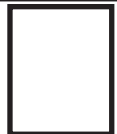
