SLMUG Minutes 4- 5-07

John Mitchell opened the meeting with a raffle of an unopened version of Adobe Digital Video Collection. All were asked to write down on the provided slip of paper a number between 1 and 100. Whoever put down the number closest to that written on the board (hidden) would win the Collection. Bev and Dayle tied; both were 11 points from the number. To break the tie, both guessed what number Bob wrote down. Dayle was the closest ... the winner.

John talked about Hard Drive Security. He put Disk Utilities on the screen. Since you can't erase the boot drive, he named a non-boot drive to erase and clicked on Security Options. The options are Don't Erase Data (erases only the directory info so that you can't access the data, but is least secure), Zero Out Data (good data security in minimum amount of time), 7-Pass Erase (provides a highly secure erasure of disk data, takes 7 times longer), and 35-Pass Erase (provides highly effective security against the recovery of data, takes 35 times more.) John told of his experience in erasing a 250 GB drive. He erased it using the 7-Pass Erase, which meets FBI forensic standards. When you empty trash containing financial information or other sensitive data, it is a good idea to do a Secure Empty Trash which does a 7-Pass Erase. John demonstrated erasing a 150 MB file. It took longer than a small file. John took general questions.

It was noted that when planning to update the OS, be sure to run Repair Disk Permissions and Disk Warrior (current is 4.0 and needs 10.3.9 or greater).

John showed his new 8 GB Seagate HD (cost \$50) and a card reader (\$40).

Bob Shayler suggested that you could explore Apple's environmental stance 1990 through 2006 on apple.com/environment. Still room to improve.

Bob showed us his .Mac web site via Shayler.org, which took us to Bob's Place at Orinda Academy. Great site.

Bob distributed a handout entitled "the underground" which dealt with the various topics. Phishing is a scam where internet fraudsters send spam or pop-up messages to lure personal and financial information from unsuspecting victims. Check out onguardonline.gov/phishing.html for practical tips to protect yourself from phishing. The "status bar" is at the bottom of the browser page (can turn it on and off with "command-/.") Be sure you have it on. It shows what is going on with the browser. It tells you where you're going on the web site. Know that if you can see them, they can see you. Your IP address gives info on what is and who is. If someone knows your IP address, they can go to your computer. Also, when you go to a web site, that site gathers information about you.

Bob demo'd several web sites such as CNN, etc. Be aware that wherever you go on the web, you are being tracked.

John reported that he was able to secure from his source at NASA an HP-8150 printer to supplement an existing HP-8000 in the Graphics Lab. Thanks from Deborah Reinerio.

Another work party will be coming up soon. Ed will let us know when.

Meeting adjourned to the Board Meeting at Bakers Square.
