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
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Business.

Box is no longer useful in its present location. M/S/C "that we change banks and open a new P.O. Box in Fremont." The new by-laws are to be approved at our November meeting.

Bob demo'd backup with Time Machine. It doesn't give a bootable back up. He has been using prosoft's Data Backup which took a long time to back up his hard drive. He bought another Seagate HD and formatted it with zeros ... took 1 1/2 days to back up. He tried Carbon Copy Cloner ... was 1 hour in and it hung! Bob bought a 1 TB firewire 800 laCie HD, formatted with zeros. He will use it for his backups instead of Time Machine. He showed what was backed up from his 250 GB HD (from his school) with Time Machine. Looks like a complete backup but is not bootable. So, suggested we purchase "Superduper" program (\$27.95) which can do a bootable clone backup. It is a 5 star program. With "Disk Utility" click on Restore and drag the dmg to Source



Complete the process. This is faster than "Data Backup" and produces a bootable clone.

Use "Migration Assistant" to move stuff from one machine to a new one of the same kind (Intel or Power PC). When using "Toast" set it for Mac only if you have problems copying PC and Mac.

Bob told about hellomynameis.com for social networking like twitter, etc.

A bit of this and a byte of that...

I am glad summer is over. I worked all summer and then had throat surgery. Now that it is September, SLMUG is again meeting and the fun will resume!

Sometimes I just get to wondering, "what ever happened to (fill in a name here)?" Of course, one can Google a name but often that leads to millions of hits, even when one is using good search techniques. There is this web site that is SO cool; it has found everyone I have asked it to search for without a lot of irrelevant results! It's called pipl (www.pipl.com). The pipl home page has only one design purpose: people search. Fill in the boxes, as many as you wish: First Name, Last Name, City, State, Country. Of course, I tried my own name, on the theory I would recognize myself if pipl found me. I was first in the list that popped up. Pipl even was smart enough to know that "Bob" might be a nickname for "Robert" and returned that also. Pipl returns address, phone and other info so people can find you. It does not return sites that simply mention your name (unlike Google).

Pipl is a search site like Dogpile in that it displays results from other search sites like ZabaSearch and WhitePages. If you are really into it, you can even click the links to pay sites like People Finders and US Search.

It does have some quirks. It found me on MySpace but not on Facebook. On neither of those sites is my "name" my real name. Maybe it just shows how Facebook has better privacy controls.

I clicked the link to People Finders just to see what that pay site would show me for free. It shows "possible relatives" and included a couple of people I don't know but whose US mail we keep getting. I also got a laugh when it thought I might be related to my wife's ex. What would it show for you?

I also did some actual real work on my Mac running Leopard (of course). I installed Office 2008 and Adobe's Dreamweaver CS3. As for Office 2008, I have to keep up with my students. My old version of Dreamweaver MX is not compatible with Leopard and causes crashes with simple stuff like copy-pasting. So, I needed the new versions.

Office 2008 installed without a hitch and has functioned just fine so far. It does, by default, save its files in a new format (.docx) not immediately readable by Office 2004. But you can "Save as" to the old format (.doc). Office 2008 allows three installs for the student/home version which is cool as we have three Macs.

Dreamweaver CS3 installed fine but when it did its auto-updating, one update hung until I restarted and then it completed. Adobe allows only one install with DW CS3. Also I had a scare when DW CS3 would not read my template file for my Critical Issues Forum web site. It apparently did not use my Site set-up from MX (kind of a basic function in my mind). All is now well since I have set my Site preferences manually in CS3. Thanks go to Jenny Mitchell for hauling my butt out of that issue!

Learning with iTunes

Although iTunes is an excellent application for organizing music and video files, it is really much more than that. iTunes, in combination with the iTunes store, can be a great tool for learning. Using podcasts, iTunes U and audiobooks, you can broaden your knowledge on a vast array of topics, including politics, business and the arts. In this article, I describe some of the options available for using iTunes to extend your learning.

Podcasts

There are thousands of podcasts available on all sorts of topics, such as world events, computer technology and modern literature. Many of the podcasts are available for free directly through the iTunes store. For example, if you are interested in following the US 2008 elections, go to the iTunes store for the US and, using the store's power search feature, search for elections. You will find dozens of podcasts, including those from most of the major television networks. Once you find a podcast you like, you can subscribe to it and have episodes automatically downloaded to iTunes. No matter where you live, you can access and subscribe to podcasts from any iTunes store. Just select the store you want from the bottom of the iTunes store window and search for podcasts.

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Another great way to enhance your knowledge at no cost is to use the iTunes store's iTunes U feature. Many top universities, including Stanford, Vanderbilt, Yale, and UCLA-Berkeley, have added free content to iTunes U. You can download complete courses or lectures on a variety of topics, such as music, art, business, and technology. For example, I listened to a complete course on "Politics and Music."

To access iTunes U content, go to the iTunes store and click the iTunes U button on the left side of the window. A list of universities will appear and you can browse through the available offerings from any of the universities.

Audiobooks

A third way to learn using iTunes is with audiobooks. Most audiobooks are not free from the iTunes store, but if you have an iTunes account, you can purchase audiobooks, such as popular novels or biographies. There are, however, other sources for acquiring audiobooks, including some free sources. For example, the Gutenberg Project has many classic novels, now in the public domain, available as audiobooks. You can download these audiobooks and then manually add them to iTunes.

Conclusion

As you can see, there are several ways you can use iTunes to advance your knowledge. Take a trip to the iTunes store today and find some podcasts, iTunes U courses or lectures or audiobooks and sit back and learn.
